Dear Friends in Christ,

Did you know that in 1999 Garth Brooks re-recorded Andy Williams' popular holiday song from 1963, "It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year?" I don't know why, but when I hear Garth Brooks sing it, I really listen more closely to the lyrics. It is his unique voice, I guess. The same is true for James Earl Jones; who doesn't listen to Darth Vader when he's speaking? There is even an app for James Earl Jones reading the Bible. I've been listening to it lately, and it's amazing what all I've heretofore missed. Anyway, the first stanza in Williams' perennial favorite opens this way:

It's the most wonderful time of the year With the kids jingle belling And everyone telling you be of good cheer It's the most wonderful time of the year

It's not a sacred song, per se, but it's certainly hallowed inasmuch that everybody this time of year feels almost religiously compelled to dish out advice on how all of us – how you, too – can be "of good cheer."

Considering all that has been 2021, I've noticed there seems to be even more supposed advice and counsel than ever. Whether it's advice on a new Netflix series to take your mind off things, or tips for how you can be more productive while working from home...or on your marriage, or how to learn another language during the pandemic – it's easy to believe that if we just try hard enough we will deliver ourselves from any challenge, or at least find an escape hatch.

Christmas, however, tells an altogether different story: namely, that deliverance does not come from within, but from the outside – from God in Christ taking on flesh to save us from our sins and love us unconditionally. Some theologians call this a "Christology from above" – that deliverance is initiated not from within, but from God's heavenly plan of grace manifest on earth. And that's real, two-hundred proof liberation.





Thou hast multiplied the nation, thou hast increased its joy; they rejoice before thee as with joy at the harvest, as men rejoice when they divide the spoil. For the yoke of his burden, and the staff for his shoulder, the rod of his oppressor, thou hast broken as on the day of Midian. A Narrated Gospel and Live Nativity (All children are invited to participate in our Live Nativity)

Priest: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. (Luke 2:1-20) *People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.*

In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be enrolled. This was the first enrollment, when Ouirinius was governor of Syria. And all went to be enrolled, each to his own city. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the city of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, to be enrolled with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. And while they were there, the time came for her to be delivered. And she gave birth to her first-born son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn. And in that region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with fear. And the angel said to them, "Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which will come to all the people; for to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a babe wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men with whom he is pleased!" When the angels went away from them into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened. which the Lord has made known to us." And they went with haste, and found Mary and Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger. And when they saw it they made known the saving which had been told them concerning this child; and all who heard it

wondered at what the shepherds told them. But Mary kept all these things, pondering them in her heart. And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising

The Nicene Creed (standing)

Celebrant: We believe in one God . . .

All: . . . the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Celebrant: Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. *Amen.*

The Peace and Rector's Welcome

All stand.

Celebrant: The peace of the Lord be always with you. *People: And also with you.*

The Ministers and People greet one another in the name of the Lord.

The Holy Communion


The Offertory

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.


People: It is right to give him thanks and praise.

The people kneel.

Celebrant: We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with the ever-blessed Virgin Mary, blessed Joseph, and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation. 


